Google: Respect Tech's Immigrant Workers

In recent weeks, we have watched as President Trump's actions have attacked who we are—a nation that welcomes immigrants and aspires to treat people equally regardless of creed, color, background and birthplace. Millions of immigrants serve our country everyday—as housekeepers, servers, janitors, cooks and dishwashers.

Already many companies are taking powerful stands against attacks on immigrants to advocate in the best interests of their employees and their companies' future prosperity.

Google, one of the largest, most profitable technology companies in the world—and a company with thousands of cafeteria workers, janitors, security guards, shuttle drivers, groundskeepers, and other service workers in its offices around the country—has spoken out in a unique way. Google joined an amicus brief against the Trump administration's first travel ban. Its founder and parent company board member Sergey Brin joined the protests at San Francisco International Airport. In January, more than 2,000 Google employees around the world staged a walkout in protest of the travel ban.

Many organizations have called for May 1, 2017 to be a day of action—a day with no work, no school, and no purchasing.

We call on Google to honor the wishes of any workers who want to participate in those actions. In particular, service workers, many of whom work for subcontractors, may wish to participate in demonstrations or walkouts on that day. We call on Google not to discipline those workers who participate, and we also call on them to hold their food service, janitorial, security, and other contractors to the same standard.
